### Rahab the Prostitute of Jericho



For some, the story of Rahab can be a bit of a head-scratcher, while her induction into the Hebrews' Faith Hall of Fame (Hebrews 11) might be quite surprising, if not shocking.

Even more remarkable is that Apostle Paul mentioned Rahab, a Canaanite prostitute, right after Moses, while

Joshua who leads the Israelites into the Promised Land, is omitted altogether (Hebrews 11:24-31). Pause and think about that for a minute. And Paul is not the only one who mentions her as a hero of faith. James also places Rahab right next to Abraham, the "father of the faithful," as an example of someone whose faith in action overcame adversity and social status (James 2:25).

Interestingly enough, a handful of Bible commentators, perhaps uncomfortable with Rahab being portrayed in such a positive light, attempted to sanitize her employment history, suggesting that Rahab, at the time she is mentioned in Joshua 2, might not have been actively engaged in prostitution and that the reference to her occupation was a mere allusion to her troubled past. Although it appears that at the time she interacted with the spies Rahab was running an ancient form of Airbnb in addition to some textile manufacturing business (Joshua 2:6), the Bible repeatedly calls her Rahab the prostitute.

Furthermore, in Luke 7:36-48, we read how Jesus, while attending dinner at one of the Pharisees' houses, allowed a woman with a troubled history to anoint His feet with a costly, fragrant oil. Even though this woman, just like Rahab, had a dubious reputation, it did not stop Jesus from interacting with her and accepting her sacrificial gesture to the dismay of the distinguished guests. Just like the Pharisees, gathered in Simon's house, occasionally we might also be tempted to look down on people and treat them poorly

because of their reputation, overlooking the fact that in Jesus everyone can find forgiveness and acceptance.

In the world's eyes, someone might be known for his or her past transgressions, but in God's eyes, all of us are someone precious enough for Christ to suffer unimaginable pain and die on the cross.

As we read Rahab's story, we should not spend too much time debating, or feeling uncomfortable with Rahab's career choices but rather focus on her faith. Rahab's life is the story of faith and redemption which every one of us can relate to or at least sympathize with.

In Matthew 1:3-6 Rahab is mentioned again, and this time her name is part of Jesus' lineage as she went on to marry Salmon and give birth to Boaz. She is one of five women mentioned in Matthew's genealogy of Christ; Tamar the wife of Judah, Rahab the wife of Salmon, Ruth the wife of Boaz, Bathsheba the wife of King David, and Mary the Mother of Jesus. "Salmon the father of Boaz, whose mother was Rahab, Boaz the father of Obed, whose mother was Ruth, Obed the father of Jesse, and Jesse the father of King David (Matthew 1:5). Other than Mary, Rahab is the only one mentioned again in the New Testament. In my opinion, Rahab's not-so-honorable profession is included in the Bible text as an assurance that Jesus is not ashamed to have a woman with such a questionable past in His earthly ancestry, and neither should we. "For the One who sanctifies, and those who are sanctified, all have one Father. That is why Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers, saying: "I will proclaim Your name to My brothers; I will sing hymns to You in the congregation". (Hebrews 2:11, 12)

In 1 Corinthians 6:9, 10, the Apostle Paul mentions several pretty egregious transgressions and makes it painfully clear that none of these unrepented sinners will inherit the kingdom of God. However, one verse over, Paul delivers the great news: all of us, regardless of our past transgressions, are justified and sanctified in Jesus Christ – "And such were some of you. But you were washed, but you were sanctified, but you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus and by the Spirit of our God. (1 Cor 6:11).

Recently, it was reported in the press that actor Bob Odenkirk was overwhelmed with emotion to learn that his DNA analysis revealed that he is a distant cousin of His Majesty King Charles III of England. If being the 11th cousin of a current early royalty makes a Hollywood celebrity ecstatic, how much honored and overjoyed should we all be knowing that God of the universe calls us His sons (1 John 3:1) and Jesus, the Lord of lords and King of kings, calls us brothers and sisters!?

"And looking about at those who sat around Him, He said, Here are My mother and My brothers! For whoever does the will of God, he is My brother and sister and mother" (Mark 3:34, 35).

To respect Him in the home, the neighborhood, and the church, and to have a soft heart toward our great and loving God. God wants to bestow all of this on us as a free gift of His grace. It has been called the sanctified life. May this be the choice we make in the new year as the Holy Spirit gives us guidance. Pray for the presence of God's Spirit, and He will not disappoint you, and the fruits of the Spirit will blossom, and crowd out those things that disappoint. We receive the Holy Spirit as we respond with thankful and prayerful hearts for what the Lord has done in Christ.

I'm reminded of a saying I heard at camp meeting many years ago; "If your heart is right with God today, you would be ready if He came today". To Seventh-day Adventists who love His appearing, that's a precious promise.

Even so come Lord Jesus.

# Stuff From a Bible Buff



"Bible Buff," eh? Surely, if you're an SDA, you're a Bible buff also. None of us would hold membership in this denomination if we didn't cherish Scripture. That's why this column is "Stuff From a Bible Buff." Did you notice that indefinite article? I'm not the Bible buff, as though I'm the only fan of God's Word. I'm one of many.

You, too, could share thoughts you've gleaned from Scripture. So why am I (not you) authoring this column? Simple. I'll share what I think harmonizes best with both the immediate literary context and the larger biblical and theological backgrounds.

I'll do my best to try to understand what the biblical writer wanted to communicate. However, I'm not the answer man but, like you, am a seeker after truth.

Let's regard this column as an expedition into Scripture.
